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I put a Technics SL 1600 downstairs couple three weeks ago. It came with a new Shure M92; like a 25\$ cartridge. I hooked that to my old Pioneer SS reciever I got at a garage sale for 10\$. It sounded real good. So I took some of that blue adhesive they use for RV windowglass; and I cemented the stylus to the cartridge. Then I leveled off the table and spent a half-hour adjusting the cart properly. Sounds damned good on the Pi Theater 4's. I sat just now listened to the whole first Dire Straights album; the one with Down to The Waterline on it. Great stuff; total outlay; 90\$ for the table/10\$ for the amp. You can't beat those old Technics for value for a buck.

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If you have a removable stylus; not a moving coil cart; you just pull the stylus out then with a toothpick you take small drops of that blue adhesive they use to secure poly windows to the frame in RV's and line it along the plastic perimeter of the stylus; the part that touches the body of the cartridge. Then just gently replace the stylus so the adhesive bonds the stylus to the cart body. Let it cure then you get a much better bass/tighter detail better information recovery. It really is like buying a more expensive cartridge. They say it damps resonance; create a tighter mechanical bond and adds mass. Whatever it does; believe me it works. (Although I wouldn't try it on my 1k\$ Shelter 901.) (Thats if I had one; or could afford one.) Which Technics do you have?

You have to pay cash, figure the shipping and they'll refund any difference. The inventory changes monthly, and currently is pretty lean. They buy overstocks, takeoffs and overruns. Years ago the motors used to come with serial #'s ground out. 3.5 is pretty small even for 2.5k gen. I'd be looking at a 5. I'd also look at tecumseh. I've always had good luck with them, no matter what the rep. Let me know what you want and I'll check the wholesale price for you.

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Well; there really isn't that much you need to know. At the price level you mention and you want to go new; then think about certain things is how I look at it. Is the arm decent? Does the table have a following; ie, is there good manufacturer support. What is your long term goal regarding albums. Do you want to build a collection; or do you just want something to play a hundred or so records on. At the 400\$ price point you can get a decent deck that will play records and sound good. If you want or plan to build a real collection then you might want to spend more. That deck looks good; I am sure they are OEM suppliers for it so we don't know who makes it; but at that price and with a cartridge you can get by and be happy. I mean really how many hours a day will you be listening? Now if you want audiophile sound; well that's a different ballgame. What does the VPI JR sell for nowadays?
