I agree Nemeria, reverb is an effect and you need it for live sound vocals as long as you don't go overboard with it. I've even run reverb plus chorus (extra delay on top of the reverb) to double the vocal's on some songs of the band's I've mixed. Too much reverb overdone can suck on a live mix.

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
