to be sure it listed for something like \$800 back then and with inflation a fair comparison would probably be against equipment that most users would never see in a store now. Likely new gear would be in the \$8000 range. Many new pieces of equipment are designed with a limited life span and designed to be trashed after a few years. Cheaper for sure, but kind of a sad comment on how we think and what is valuable. Much of the vintage gear..partly because it was a significant financial investment was build to last. Two of the best performing turntables I have are over 40 years old, one nearly 50.
