I have a pair of NHT SuperOne's and they are the best speakers I have heard for the money, but they don't play loud without a lot of power, and I am afraid that a low powered tube amp will start clipping at reasonable volume levels with my SuperOnes. 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A pair of Two Pi Bass Reflex drivers and Xover will run you \$120. This leaves you \$280 for cabs. Should be VERY doable for a \$400 budget. I honestly don't think you will do much better in your price range, sorry. I would take the advice of [hurdy_gurdyman](#) to heart - look beyond sensitivity. I'm running a 35 wpc PP tube through Maggies (MMG-W, \$300/pair), which are about as inefficient as you can get. No, they will not play concert level, but they sound pretty awesome. They do, however, require a sub below 100HZ. Please let us know what you decide.....Colin
