Probably "as low as you can go" is the right answer. The problem, of course, is how to afford a compression driver (not to mention the horn) that Il go that low. The obvious solution is Wayne's (or for that matter many people's) approach of going with a conventional dynamic driver in some approximation of a conical horn. But it just doesn't appeal to me - probably because I barely have a grip on even a semblance of sanity.
