This one doesn't expand as severly as some of the others and is guarenteed NOT to bend the frames of windows and doors. My cabinets were already built, so I drilled 2 5/8 inch hole, one to spray and one for viewing. It worked great, just follow the directions on the can. After it cured, the cabinets didn't ring as much when I did the "knock on wood" test.
