I picked up a Stewart Warner tombstone radio a few years ago. Case was in pretty good shape, but the chassis had been used as a animals' nets for years. I removed the chassis and cleaned the mouse crap out the best I could. It cleaned up pretty well; however, the air-gap tuning cap is in pretty rough shape. The fins are oxidized but still turn. The Tx still works, but I know the caps need to be replaced before any more testing. There is no model number that I can find, so if I post a picture and tube compliment could someone help ID and point me to a schematic?I would like to get this restored just to prove to myself that I can do this. I found a old junk store in the middle of nowhere that has a ton (yeap, stacked floor to ceiling in an old shed) of old tube radios just sitting around waiting to be restored. That's excellent. It will be worth doing, I assure you. Most times, it isn't a difficult job. Usually just replace the caps and the tubes and you're set. In fact, I usually find at least half the tubes still work, but I almost always buy two sets of replacement tubes for inventory, just so I know I'll be able to keep my old radios running for years to come.
