Woofers with cakemagnets don't sound as good unless they have copper in the pole piece, then they'regood too, some say better. Put your money in a good woofer, that's the most importantthing for clean, tight bass. The cabinet is important too, but it all starts withthe woofer. 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For high power (over 100 watts) low frequency (below 80 Hz)I'm using the new Eminence HL10a. In the same box with 200 watts input it gives me an additional 7dB output at 40 Hz compared to a Beta 10, due to the elimination of power compression. I find that the Beta 10 works fine with up to 100 watts in, but beyond that the higher BI of the HL10a allows much improved cone control, especially with high throat impedances. The high xMax of the HL10a also makes bottoming out a non-issue. However, with 100 watts or less input the Beta ten is more sensitive, so which to use is definetely a matter of intended usage. Since there's a \$100 price differential it's an important consideration.

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The HL10A is made for horns so it can handle the pressure. No offense, but I don'tthink the Beta 10 would be any good at all. No power handling and a thin cone that canrip real easy, so it easy to burn and rip. I think its good for a full range monitor speakerbut not for a bass horn, IMHO.Can your horns use TAD 1102, Adire Brahma 10 or even a Dayton Titanic MK3?They are expensive, but you get what you pay for. Use the HL10A for budget models.

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The Beta 10 won't handle extreme pressures, but up to 100 watts or above 80 Hz it's perfectly comfortable; I've been using them in horns for years with no ill effect. I've had no problem with them structurally up to 200 watts below 80 Hz, but by then the power compression causes so much throat distortion that you're not going to put that much power into it for very long. As long as the specs are OK you could certainly use premium drivers in my boxes. I don't personally anymore, as I've found mid priced drivers to be adequate, and saving money on drivers is one of the nice aspects of horns versus direct radiators. The Titanic III (it is an Eminence OEM for Parts Express) is actually very similar to the HL10a, but with its lower Fs and higher Qts it isn't as well suited to horn loading.

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John Sheerin is in a better position to know, but I believe that most Daytons are Eminence sourced. In pictures the motors are different but the frames appear identical between the LAB12 and the Titanic III. Another giveaway is the lack of a 'Made in China' stamp on the Daytons, as well as packaging identical to Eminence's. I could be wrong, but I don't believe that Dayton (Parts Express house brand) actually makes anything themselves.

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I do vent my midbass boxes, though the venting is optional. With venting the Fb is lower, but SPL a bit lower as well around Fc, so vented vs non-vented is a matter of whether you want a wider bandwidth or maximum SPL. I recommend that if you run them stand alone you vent, but if used with a sub that you stay sealed.
