I had always thought that linseed and mineral spirits were just as good so why give Minwax the money. Was I wrong! Minwax pre-stain conditioner rules. Still way better to use dye stains in water unless grain-raising is a major issue like Purfling or Marquetry. Then use alcohol and be vewy, vewy careful.
