As to sonics, probably quite circuit dependant, no?Alternate designations are the 6267 and Z729Often used as the first stage in the Mullard amp. EF86>>{twin triode LTP}>>PP finals. Direct coupled usually so as to use an acceptable tail resistor in the phase splitter. The Eico HF50 went EF86>6SN7>EL34 to a nice Chicago OPTx.cheers,Douglas
