I sell these for my cost, and several people have used these speakers to build systems whose total cost including source, amplification, speakers, speaker stands, and all cables is less than \$400. Of course the system I'll exhibit the BR1's with will be quite a bit more expensive. It incudes a \$300 Cambridge Audio integrated and a \$160 Oppo universal player. A ridiculously expensive "audiosnob" system.I'll definitely be there, but my objective at this time is to attract a few Houston audio manufacturers to join us. So far I've discussed it with Dennis Deacon of D-Sonic amps and Jim Goulding of Diffractionbegone, and both seem interested.

I'll get back with you. There's a story about this. My Houston Audio Society friends own relatively expensive systems, typcially costing \$20-\$40K. One member's system cost far more than \$250K. We've discussed the problem of how to get friends, relatives, and neighbors into high end audio, and the problem is that most of the people we know could easily afford a \$10K system, but they are psycologically unprepared to spend that much on a stereo. In spite of the fact that they may

drive a Mercedes S-series car, the idea of a stereo costing more than \$500 is something they can't get their mind to embrace.Linda and I do lots of entertaining in our home, and inevitably the guys who visit want to hear the big Selah XT-8 line arrays driven by Krell amplification, and are blown away by the sound. When they ask how much a sytem like mine costs, instead of telling them the actual price, I tell them it cost a lot, but I have a system upstair that cost less than \$500, and both they and their wife will like it. Then I bring them upsairs, put on a CD I know their wife will like, and sit her (not him) in the sweet spot to listen.I'm convinced the answer is to get a correctly-set-up \$500 system into their home, and after they have listened to their favorite music on it while drinking a glass of good merlot they will be back for more and better. The upstairs system includes the Parts Express BR1's, a mass market DVD player, and a \$100 Best Buy Insignia stereo receiver. I've even built some low tech high mass stands for the BR1's. They're cinderblocks from Home Depot. The speaker cables are Blue Jeans bulk \$0.68/ft Belden. Every non-audiophile I sit in the sweet spot to hear this system is amazed, and several have bought the BR1's and the mass market electronics I recommend.

Forgot to mention, I have a small (32") LCD TV on the top shelf of the equipment rack, and I strongly recommend to people who hear my stetem that they get a DVD player with upscaling and HDMI output. This will enbable them to view DVD's in relatively high definition, with the added advantage of a good two channel audio system set up to complement the TV. I know that placing a TV between the speakers is anathema to may two channel stereo lovers, but everybody watches DVD's, and this system is light years better than a Sony 5.1 HT-in-a-box system with plastic speakers. Remember, the strategic objective isn't to get them the best two channel system they are willing to buy, but to get them the two channel system they will enjoy the most.

Shane, I booked my reservations, and I will be exhibiting under the name "AudioFred Low End Audio...Specializing in mid-fi sound for the discriminating doublewide owner". What else would you expect when you buy speakers from a guy named Fred? I'll be exhibiting the world's best sounding under-\$400 sytem, featuring the Parts Express BR-1 Reference monitor speakers (\$195 assembled with much-needed additional enclosure bracing and upgraded internal wiring, the \$99 Best Buy Insignia two channel receiver, and a \$45 Phillips DVD player from Wal Mart. For the audiophile with deep pockets I'll also be exhibiting the world's best under-\$700 system using the BR-1's with the \$260 Virtue Audio Virtue One class T integrated amplifier and the \$160 Oppo DV-980H universal player. I'm not in the speaker business, and I have no desire to enter that snake pit, but I will build a pair of BR-1's with the extra enclosure bracing for anybody who asks for \$195, which is my cost with the extras I put into them. While this may all seem like a joke, the purpose is to demonstrate to non-audiphiles that you don't have to spend a fortune to have good sound in your home. Everybody listens to music, and most do it on equipment that doesn't approach the cabability of even a mid fi system. Most music lovers would like to hear better sound, and many can afford a really good system, but there's a big psylogical barrier to spending even as little as \$1K on a complete system if you've never thought about it before. My under \$400 system is accessible to almost everyone, and it's likely if they build mine, next year they will return to some others LSAF commercial exhibitors for better equipment. It's like giving away dime bags of crack cocaine. No experienced listener will confuse either of these systems with high end, but even the under-\$400 version sounds amazingly coherent and involving. Adding the Virtue One and the Oppo takes the system to a level that rivals most \$1K to \$1.5K systems I've heard.

The key is to convince them to set up a room and demo some affordable equipment. If they have a demo room they will want to advertise it; if they don't they will not want their customers to know about it. It's that simple. Convincing them requires that somebody actually visit their store and talk this up with the owner. Ideally it would be somebody who already knows the owner. If this were in Houston it would be very easy because we have a viable audio society and the owners of the local high end stores know our leaders very well.

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
