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Having heard and listened to all the models in question with both solid state amps and tube amps. I maintain the following opinion. You get what you pay for. I'm not going to say that the Thermionic or Theatre series is bad in any respect. I'm simply saying the more expensive drivers sound more controlled and cleaner to the ears than the less expensive drivers. You can't always pay attention to the specifications. There are lots of speakers around the world that have the same specs (of 40hz-16k for example). Each and every one sounds different even though the spec is the same. Along the same line as that thought comes my next opinion, that even though the Theatre series shows a lower bass response, I'm saying the the bass response from a Stage series is "better bass" I've never had any difficulties playing any of these models with smaller amps. Even though the Zmax reaches to just over a hundred on the Stage and Premium stage (pro for that matter too) The amp is less able to control the driver, but the driver is less boomy and more controlled already. So is the control factor a wash? I doubt it and I'm not going to do the math to figure it out. But, They all sound great and since I don't try and play a "concert level" with a SET amp. I don't have any problems and I have always felt the better sounds came from the better drivers such as the Premium Stage, and the Stage. Lots of guys have built different kits and packages and are quite happy with what they have. And they should be, they all sound great. If you want to run a 2A3 or a 45. It is going to sound fine. You just have less headroom and with a 45 and total output will be as such. From building and listening to each and every one of these models. My top picks are the 4 Pi, Premium stage or Stage. Ciao,

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Hi Bill; When you compare the various models, and I know you have different types of amplifiers so it's a good all around exposure; the stage and premium, the premium uses the top end Eminence I believe. On the bottom end sound, can you describe a little what you hear if you don't mind. See I would like to start another project but I cannot determine which driver of the smaller cabinet sizes to use. It seems to me w/o having heard them that the JBL would most likely return the most bang for the buck in terms of resolution, sounding musical and reproducing low piano notes accurately as well as acoustic bass. I also wonder at the differences between the higher end Eminence drivers. I realise that it's hard to describe sound but you seem to have a good way with description so I think it would be helpful, if you don't mind. I am convinced I understand what you mean by better bass I am just curious if there is a sonic signature from the different drivers. Thanks Much; J.R. (The Stage Three with the twelve inch driver; is that a little faster and will it push the bass notes well?)

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Hi JR. The difference between the JBL and the Kilomax is a tough choice. Blind test, money no object. JBL will come out on top. Wayne has chosen well to make the JBL driver his top dog in the Pro series. It's an awesome driver and very well respected, (and envied!) As far as bang for the buck goes, I would have to toss my hat into the Kilomax ring. It is more bang for the buck. When you get into the 300+ per driver range. Getting what you pay for begins to have diminishing returns. I personally run JBL drivers. I like them. I pay almost retail for them too! I just don't use enough to be a contender in the pricing structure. ( I get TAD at better costing than JBL ! ) The Kilomax is a real tough driver to beat for the money. It sounds clean and deep with punctuality. I have not used any Eminence Magnum drivers yet. These were made with many similar characteristics to other top low distortion drivers and I understand they sound great. I'm considering them for an upcoming project in fact. Also into the ring are older JBL drivers. I have heard some but with only limited use compared to some of the experts who have been in this circle for many more years than I. I hear tell the 2205 and 2225 have a softer suspension and are actually better for home use than the 2226. If you can find these at a good price I suggest a prompt purchase. For the 3Pi which uses the 12" Delta LF. I have not used this driver in a 3Pi. I favor this drive very much and have used it quite often in my own designs. I like it better than its 15" big brother Delta 15. The Omega 15 will outperform the delta 12 in my book and the Kilomax still on the top of the pile. Two delta 12LF or a pair of magnum 12's might be something out of this world. If you have a budget to stay in. The Kilomax will absolutely not let you down. It's just tremendous. If you can pony up for a JBL, They have the Name, the Performance, the Sound, the Quality and, the, Resale value. I just want to say one more thing in this long winded..... Get what your comfortable buying. They all sound great. There isn't any point in overextending yourself to reach the next level. Get a kit. Work out a design. Have some fun building a project and save a few bucks doing it. Sit back and relax while you listen to things you never heard in music before. It's all about the speaker....Bill

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Chad, For my music only system I have VMPS RM40's. These are an absolute top of the line floor standing speaker. For my home theater system I have bookshelf speakers from GR Research. Very nice speakers also. I just completed the Stage 4 Pi's about a month ago. These were my first venture into high efficiency horn speakers. I have to say that I am impressed. No, they are not in the same league with the much more expensive RM40's and they may lack the smoothness of the GR Research speakers but they are nonetheless a heck of a lot of fun to listen to. They have a great dynamic range and room filling sound that is reminiscent of the real thing. They would be very hard to beat for the price as a combination music/home theater speaker. There is really no comparison between one of these as a center channel speaker and a small bookshelf type. Three of the Stage 4 Pi's across the front would be a truly awesome sound. You might even get by with two of these and no center channel speaker. I am considering something like this myself now (the ones I built are now in my basement rec room). 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Hi Dave, I agree that the Deltalites look very good. I have been told that the Magnum series could sound better in reality though. I haven't done anything with the Deltalites yet, though I would like to because I'm a big fan of all the neo magnet drivers and I especially like the lighter weight. A 12" Deltalite weighs 1/3 the 12" Magnum. The 2226 is a tight driver but personally I have no issue with it at low volumes. Maybe one of the 22xx with a softer suspension would be ideal or optimum. The 2226 is a great all around piece for me. There's lots of good used 22xx drivers out there and I'm always happy to own or build with any of them. I run 2226G which is the 4 ohm model. I like the 4 ohm cone driver with 8ohm compression drivers for keeping the total sensitivity higher. Bill

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Hi Bill, Thanks for the info! With regard to the Deltalites, I was thinking about doing something with a 10" Deltalite and a BMS HD540ND, crossed over at 2.2KHz. I think it might make a nice manageable sized speaker. My tinkering is that the 10" should not be beaming too much at 2.2KHz and that would be a good crossover for the BMS. The only downside I see is that I would have to pad the BMS down a lot. If I wanted to do your 4 ohm thing, I could do an MTM (really a WTW) and that would save me 3db on the pad. I never thought that there might be a benefit to running a 4 ohm woofer with an 8 ohm compression driver but I did know that JBL used to run 16 ohm compression drivers with 8 ohm woofers. Do tube amps like this kind of load? I use both tube

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and transistor, being a vintage collector. I asked about the JBL because, even though it is a big driver it works in a small cabinet. There are also a lot of them out there, so I might be able to get a pair cheap.Dave

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Hi Dave,If you can snatch up a 2226 for good price, you'll fall in love with it. low, med, or high volume. It's just a great all around driver and it's clean and pure.The Deltalite should be a great driver for your arrangment. I am wanting to do the same thing when time permits. The 4540nd crossed over at 2.2 is perfect. I have been more partial to an MMT instead of the MTM. Either way should be good. You'll need a pair of the 10" because the sensetivity on the 10 is less than you would like. I would wire them in parallel so you have a 4ohm woofer. Tubes? hard for me to say. in most cases a true 8ohm load might be better for 'most' amps, as a generalized statement. Using a 4ohm load for a woofer with a passive crossover and an 8ohm load for the tweeter is not as harsh a scenario as a true 4ohm designed speaker.Bill
